Reflecting on recent challenges, looking to the future

Welcome to the latest edition of the Pen y Cymoedd Wind Farm Community newsletter.

It has been a challenging year for everyone in different ways, but Pen y Cymoedd and the Community Fund has remained a constant within the local area; providing funding support for projects in the communities in which the Wind Farm is rooted.

Throughout the pandemic, our team at Pen y Cymoedd has kept the 76 turbines turning, while ensuring that employees and contractors stayed safe and healthy. Meanwhile the Community Fund team has worked throughout to continue to support community

groups and local businesses, including providing emergency funding to projects helping those most in need during these difficult times.

The emergency Covid funding aimed to protect cash flow and support new or diversified pandemic-related projects. During 2020, the Fund supported 40 businesses and community groups with Covid survival funding of £378,966, and a further 28 groups with funding of £193,898 for pandemic support related projects.

Community Fund Focus

More than ever, the past year has highlighted the value of community spirit. At the very heart of the Fund's purpose is the aim of supporting and growing the outstanding work that goes on – usually with little fanfare – at grassroots level.

With an annual budget of £1.8 million until 2043, the fund offers a real and significant opportunity for local people to invest in themselves and their ideas – building on opportunities and challenges in their communities.

One example that encompasses the ethos of the fund, is Glynneath Training Centre's O Dan yr Awyr (Under the Sky) growing and learning project. It is a fantastic showcase of education, partnership working and sustainable community living.



Glynneath Training Centre: O Dan yr Awyr (Under the Sky)



This project, based in the upper Neath valley and led by Glynneath Training Centre, secured a £194,258 Vision Fund award over four years to promote community food growing. The funding aimed to help the charity deliver an ambitious and multi-faceted 'food movement'.

Part of the appeal of this project from a funding perspective is its truly community-led nature, and its aim to champion existing growing spaces and encourage the creation of new ones. This involves community members working collaboratively and building partnerships with local authorities, community organisations, planners and private land-owners to turn disused land into productive community gardens.

The project is also delivering green learning activities to schools, nurseries, community growing groups and allotments, as well as growing volunteering opportunities and offering horticultural courses and workshops for the community.

Pre-Covid activities

Following the initial funding injection, the project got off to a flying start by immediately establishing a base at Glynneath Allotments where volunteers could meet and attend workshops. Early activities included building partnerships with four local primary schools and collaborating with volunteers from the National Autistic Society to carry out a litter pick in Glynneath.

After this strong start, the project was paused at the end of March 2020 due to lockdown and planned activities were placed on hold. However, from August 2020 onwards, activity started again. Some recent highlights include:

Working with partnership schools

The team has been working with partnership schools to carry out groundwork and general gardening; weeding planters and planting spring bulbs, cutting back trees and shrubs and reshaping a willow dome.

YGG Cwmnedd has been involved with the project from the very start, carrying out a range of activities including a recycling challenge, a cemetery planting session and projects at the allotments. A teacher from YGG Cwmnedd said: "Being part of the O Dan yr Awyr Project has provided us with so many wonderful opportunities for learning and improving our school spaces. We have been able to participate in community activities, as well as socialising with the other schools. Being outdoors is an important part of the curriculum in addition to promoting well-being."

The team has also been working on the community garden plot at the allotments. This has been no mean feat and has included trimming fruit bushes and taking hardwood cuttings, clearing weeds and brambles, levelling off paths and working out the layout for new beds in the polytunnel.

So, what's next?

The team's priority now will be catching up with the partnership schools and the Community Enhancement Group to plan activities moving forward - including additional street planters, wildflowers and trees.

It looks set to be a busy few months and the Fund is absolutely delighted to have been able to support such a wonderful grassroots project that is making a marked impact in the community.





Funding update

In March 2021 alone, the Pen y Cymoedd Wind Farm Community Fund Board agreed support for 16 businesses through the Micro Fund (to a total value of £52,266), 18 community groups through the Micro Fund (to the value of £58,141) and seven Vision Fund proposals (to the value of £90,988 in grants) and £60,000 in loans.

Among the projects to benefit are:

Area: Rhondda Fawr

Project: Cwmparc Community

Association

Amount: £21,280

The 'Funding our Future' project will enable one new staff member, a Family Activity Development Officer, to get people safely back into the facility, make connections with partners across the top of the Valley and facilitate work with schools.

Area: Neath

Project: Sew Sew Happy

Amount: £2,636

Funding will enable a sewing club to be established in Aberdulais, which will create opportunities for individuals in the community to socialise through sewing. It will also offer specific classes such as family sessions, youth sessions, beginner sessions and drop in sessions.

Area: Cynon

Project: Hirwaun and Penderyn

Community Council
Amount: £4,090

Repairs and updates to the old fire station building owned by the Community Council, to enable the continuation of the gardening group based there as well as the community shop selling plants and supplies that was opened during lockdown.



Area: Afan

Project: Welsh Diving Amount: £3,000

The project will support costs to offer scuba diving for children in the Afan Valley at the local pool.



Area: Afan

Project: Tonmawr RFC Amount: £5,000

Funding will enable the investment in facilities for shared community use.



Area: Cynon

Project: Our Aberdare Business

Improvement District
Amount: £25,000

With an initial focus on improving the look and feel of the town centre, they hope this will help community spirit, engage businesses with the BID by demonstrating impact immediately and help the town look and feel ready for summer as lockdown lifts.



Area: Rhondda Fach Project: Nova Coaching Amount: £1,375

Funding offered start-up costs for Laughter Yoga to community groups and individuals, as well as life and career coaching.

Vattenfall update: powering a green recovery

A word from Dan Wills, project manager, Vattenfall



As we begin to glimpse sunnier skies ahead, it's an apt time to look at the ways in which we as a nation might now focus on re-building a greener future. As a father of two living locally, I wonder how we can move faster to build a fossil fuel free future.

Covid demonstrated how easily disrupted the systems and processes underpinning our economy are and how

global supply chains and millions of jobs can grind to a halt in the blink of an eye.

The 'great global pause' has meant a total rethink around the way the world operates but, rather than hoping for a return to normal, now is an opportunity for a radical change.

It's clearer than ever that the renewable energy sector will be a key part of a green recovery, not just creating millions of employment opportunities, but also contributing towards global net-zero targets.

There is a wide ranging consensus that several million green jobs could be unlocked within the UK in this decade alone, if sectors such as ours are scaled up and a renewed focus on renewable energy generation is sought.

As we look ahead to the new normal, it is our hope that we see much more innovation in renewable energy - to kickstart a truly green recovery.

Protecting nature and wildlife: monitoring European Nightjars

Vattenfall is committed to protecting nature and biodiversity

We have a programme of monitoring and habitat management going on all year round at Pen y Cymoedd to ensure we continue to support local wildlife.

Our local ecology expert, Mike Shewring, has been monitoring wildlife and habitat at Pen y Cymoedd since 2013, starting work well before the first turbines were installed. Mike has extensive experience of the wide range of amazing species on site, including bats, honey buzzards, water voles and a wide variety of butterflies and moths.

We caught up with Mike to hear all about the work he has been doing to find out more about the rare European Nightjars living on site.

"There is no doubt that out of all the species at Pen y Cymoedd, the European Nightjar is my favourite. This is primarily because so little is known about this highly secretive nocturnal bird.

"Nightjars are migratory birds, wintering in sub-Saharan Africa and migrating in spring to breed in locations across northern Europe. But it is more commonly found in southern heathland areas within the UK.

"We have established that there are at least 10 male birds living on site, making this a significant population within the region. We believe there are only around 300 Nightjars in Wales. "The Nightjars love feeding on the extensive moth population living at Pen y Cymoedd, which they catch using their incredible frog-like mouth. We have been working to understand more about the behaviour of these birds, such as feeding habits and migratory routes, for example using radio tag data.

"The Nightjar is a declining species, so we need to do everything we can to understand and help protect the birds we have on site, and help ensure we preserve this amazing and unusual bird for future generations."
