



Left – our 3DW programme in action with year 8s at Aylsham High School




Norfolk Zone Community Benefit Fund - Vattenfall

 Able to charge any USB device whilst you exercise – just bring the cable with you






















## Background

- Several government commitments to limit global warming to within 2°C, but already approaching 1.5°C!
- Transport accounts = ~27% of greenhouse gas emissions in the UK, most from cars/taxis.
- From 2030, no new petrol and diesel cars in the UK (hybrids from 2035)
- Sales of EVs have increased rapidly. In December 2022, 32% of new car sales were battery electric vehicles.
- Still a long way to go EVs represent ~5% of the overall car market.

## Norfolk EV Strategy

- √ Accelerate charge point deployment
- √ Review Fleet
- ✓ Collaborative working

## Norwich On-Street Charging Pilot Project



- Over 40 chargepoints on residential streets around Norwich
- First scheme of its kind in the county
- Targeting charging need in areas where there is a lack of driveway parking
- Pilot project



## Norfolk Broads

- Working with the Norfolk Broads Authority on 'Electrify the Broads'
- Innovative dockside dual-purpose charging
- Focus on providing chargepoints for holiday makers with EVs as well as chargepoints for electric boats







## **Electric Buses in Norwich**



- Over 70 electric buses to replace existing buses in Norwich over the next year, starting the end of this summer
- Partnership with First Bus for bid, funded by Department for Transport
- Will see over half of First bus fleet converted to electric, with Roundtree Way depot fully electrified.




## Survey results – hot off the press!

- Recent public survey carried out in Norfolk 405 responses
- For all respondents chargepoints at destinations was equally as important as having chargepoints at/near home.
- For users without a driveway access to chargepoints near to their homes was the single most important issue when considering owning an EV.
- For people that wanted to change to EVs the top 3 factors that were important to them were easy payment methods, transparent tariffs and speed of charging.
- Common theme through this is chargepoints.





## The Dilemma...





There aren't enough electric vehicles out there yet to make it worthwhile for my business to provide and maintain chargepoints

There's no point me getting an electric car until there are more public chargepoints that I can use





## What is Plug-In Norfolk?

A community-based public charge point network that will benefit both EV drivers and EV charge point hosts, such as parish councils.

#### Benefits for EV drivers

- A network of EV chargers that all work in the same way
- Knowledge and confidence in a local EV charging network that is reliable and looked after
- Access to a dedicated customer support helpline for assistance with using charge points
- EV chargers based in the heart of communities and destinations, where people are living and visiting.

#### Benefits for Chargepoint Hosts

- Being part of a wider community network of chargepoints
- Adding value to their local community by providing for EV drivers' needs
- Reduced/no maintenance costs
- No administration requirements
- All maintenance and customer support will be provided by a third-party
- Countywide publicity of the chargepoint network led by Norfolk County Council



## Eligibility for the scheme

- Publicly accessible off-street car parks in the heart of communities;
  - Near to local amenities/attractions and/or
  - Near to residents with no off-street residential parking flats, terraced houses
  - Preference for village halls, community centres/establishments, businesses will be considered too
- Lack of existing chargepoint provision in the area
- Space for providing at least two car parking spaces
- Existing electricity supply with spare capacity for a 7-22kW charger
- Unrestricted access 24 hours a day, 7 days a week




